Report on visit to the Essex Police Headquarters by Bill G8BYO.

Selected for his experience in VHF radio during the war, Chief-Superintendent Jenkinson has been in command of the police communications in Essex since 1946. He started our visit with a very interesting talk on the development of VHF and UHF mobile communications in the Essex police force.

Various outstations, controlled from the station in Chelmsford operate three VHF channels. This enables mobiles in almost all parts of the county to receive a readable signal; and the various signals from the mobiles are sorted by the equipment in Chelmsford and the best one selected. Frequency modulation is used in Essex, whilst amplitude modulation is the rule in the Metropolitan area. UHF is mainly used for personal portable operation. This is because of its short range characteristics when low power is employed. In addition to the countrywide channels, there are those for local operating which may be integrated into the Chelmsford system if needs arise. In fact the whole of the police communications system is an integral unit, allowing mobiles access to the police private wire system as well as the Post Office public switched network. A patrolman can thus be patched into a distant police station or home to his wife to say he'll be home late for tea.

We were especially impressed by the use of data on the system. Information may be obtained from the Police National Computer at Hendon, such as ownership of motor vehicles. Then we were shown how the mobile controllers keep track of the "front line" cars by a system of logging on and off duty. This is to be automated before long and combined with an automatic location system, a mobile will be kept under constant surveillance.
