# Decisions, decisions, A Saga of events by G3WHR.

It all starts with a piece of paper. An invitation from Eric Mollart to run a National D.F. Qualifying Event on behalf of the R.S.G.B. Decision 1 is required immediately - When? A number of dates are available and all organisers submit 1st, 2nd and 3rd choices. Hardest of all are the early months when there's not enough green cover to hide a transmitter - let alone the operator. This year we were fortunate in getting our first choice, June 15th.

Decision 2 is more difficult. Even with plenty of green cover, the choice of site demands a skilled eye, plenty of scouting, and the co-operation of the natives. Almost every spot of green on the map belongs to somebody, and shooting is very popular in Essex; choose wrong (it has happened) and you can be looking at the wrong end of a shotgun!
