Chelmsford Massachusetts.

As many of you probably know the newsletter is read by stations in Chelmsford, Mass. as well as Chelmsford, Essex, so the name of the club is now known worldwide. Also if you would like to work Chelmsford, Mass. Les runs a regular sked on Sundays at 1500 gmt on 28960 KHz, 21430 KHz or 14285 KHz.

RSGB informal discussion on Amateur Radio Matters by Daphne G8WQZ.

A few weeks ago your Secretary Andrew G8KQE was invited to an informal discussion on amateur radio matters by the RSGB's Membership and Representation Committee. As the venue for this was in Cambridge I decided that he needed a navigator and promptly offered my services. So, on the 18th October we set out for the University Arms Hotel, Cambridge. Unfortunately we arrived a little late - this was not due to my navigating - the journey took us a little longer than anticipated.

The length of time between taking the RAE and getting the results was discussed. Most exam results take 6-8 weeks, some longer, but the City and Guilds are looking into the matter. Successful candidates then have another long wait for a call sign. The Home Office are inundated with applications as soon as the results are sent out and if one is patient a call sign will be sent eventually. The pass rate this year was very high, imagine having to open and deal with 2500 applications !! The RSGB are considering ways in which they can help the Home Office in this matter.

Articles for Radio Communications was another subject raised. The RSGB is particularly concerned that although a lot of progress is being made in technology by amateurs it is not widely published. The RSGB feels that the amateur movement as a whole would benefit by articles of this nature appearing in Rad.Comm. A similar plea for not so technical articles was made, so if anyone has any material they think would be suitable for publication, the Editor would be very pleased to hear from you.

It was suggested that intermediate steps could be introduced to encourage G8's to learn morse and give a gradual change instead of one great leap e.g. a morse test at 6 words per minute and being able to use morse on 2 metres. The RSGB are giving this subject some consideration.

The fact that non-RSGB members have been using the QSL bureau was mentioned. In future the bureau will only handle RSGB members QSL cards - which is only fair.

The new HF bands were discussed, although it will be several years before they will be used. Following WARC 79 the RSGB is more than pleased that not only have they retained existing bands but have also obtained new allocations.

On the subject of the Call Book it was suggested that a supplement be issued to update the previous years call book but this would prove

uneconomical. The point was raised concerning the publication date. At present the cut off date is July just before the new call signs are issued. This date is traditional to coincide with the Leicester Exhibition but the RSGB are now looking at the possibility of changing the publication date to later in the year.

Don't forget that we have a RSGB area representative in the Club and any queries regarding RSGB matters can be put to Les G4CUT.

Other news.

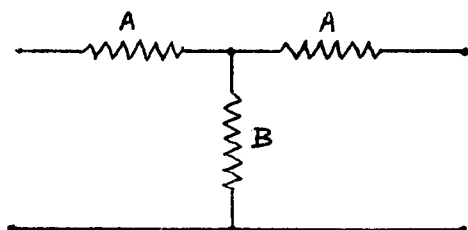
GB3DA is now operational at Danbury on Channel R5, and as expected has a very large coverage and by now a very large audience.

The chart below shows the values of resistors needed to make up T section attenuators for 75 ohm and 50 ohm impedances. In practise many of the resistors will have to be made up of a number in series and/or parallel configuration, parallel preferred, values in ohms.
