During the weekend 4-5th June, the club operated a field day station from Howletts Farm at Blackmore. The logistics of entering NFD or a similar contest are fairly daunting, but are considerably eased by maintaining continuity from year to year. Clearly there has to be some organisation, but this is kept to a minimum. There were only two pre-NFD meetings, on successive nights, to arrange operator schedules and agree the supply and transportation of equipment. The contest rules prohibited preparations on-site more than 24 hours before the 1700 GMT start, so work commenced at 10 am on sat. morning. The club entered the 'open' section, which permits any number of antennas to a max.height of 65ft. Consequently, there was quite an antenna farm; 3 element triband beam; dipoles for 80m,40m and 20m and a 300ft long wire. The hard work by John G3KRZ and Andrew G4KQE on refurbishing the club telomast was rewarded by having the beam and mast erected in record time. Arthur G3KPJ used his bow to provide sky hooks for the dipoles and the long wire. All the promised equipment arrived, thereby allowing the station to be set up and tested by 1600 !! The catering dept. provided hot and cold drinks, in personalised cups, and a supply of food. This was supplemented by Ela G6HKM, who provided a quantity of raison buns. The food supply was sufficient to provide cake for visitors at tea time on sunday, but no raison buns, the operators had apparently suffered from night starvation ! One missing feature was our usual fly-past by the RAF. To avoid disappointing aviation enthusiasts, the organisers laid on a substitute fly-past by NASA of the space shuttle Enterprise.
