LAST MONTHS MEETING - ANNUAL VIDEO & FILM SHOW - Brian 60BDS.

Another new year had started and as normal this was the time for us to broaden our knowledge on all things radio and anything else. A good selection of viewing that covered many related topics had been prepared, and it was not long before we were all watching the exploits of Owen Garriot W5LFL when he became the first Ham to use his licence in space on Space Shuttle STS 9.

His first contact using a 2 metre handheld and circular folded dipole, by the looks of it, was WA1JXN. It was some miracle that the TV camera just happened to be at that chap's

shack at the right time, or was it arranged?

The video then went on to extol the virtues, and quite rightly, of amateur involvement in all the new technology that is now taken for granted, things like AMSAT and computers. The second video about the Japanese Amateur Satellite JAS1 told us it took about three

years of high technical effort to design and build this Digital and Analogue equipemnt with Up Link on 144MHz and Down Link on 435MHz. Its weight of about 50KG was finally put into space on the back of a "Private" rocket on 13th August, 1986 after much testing. Once in orbit and having been tested once more from planet Earth, it was given the call sign AGIJAS and is now used by Amateurs worldwide.

Microwave Artistry, from the Big "M" was next, and in this, we were privileged to see two of our own members, namely Phil GOELM and Murray G6JYB. The video made at Great Baddow gave viewers an insight into the developments currently taking place within the Research Development site. On video Phil showed us advice for measuring the speed of a shell as it leaves the muzzle of an Army Mobile Gun. Other items shown included Strip Line and E plane transmission lines, Circulators, Combiners and test equipment operating up to at least 100GHz or more.

A video from the British National Space Centre identified several major existing and future projects they have on their Menu, projects like H.O.T.G.L. and Olympus, the biggest

ever communications satellite.

After the tea break we saw a promotional video on Inmos Transputers and the way in which they can be used to provide Parallel Processing, which means a linear increase in After the tea break we

computing power as further Transputers are added.

As Dick G3WHR put the final touches to his cine equipment to show us HF Field Day 1977 we had what is becoming the customary TOM & JERRY cartoon. 1977 Field Day had the style, Members in Hylands Park erecting an enormous three band quad which they then without the aid of a scaffold tower miraculously placed it on top of the pneumatic tower. Some of the faces are ones we still see at current Field Days, including that wellknown Toxophilite Arthur G3KPJ and Les G4CUT.

So once again our thanks go to Les for the loan of his VCR and Dick for the Cine equipment, not forgetting anybody else who brought things like video tapes that were not

used.

CODE-BREAKER - Bill Cole, G4JUW.

Morse Code, the means of communication devised by Samuel Morse in 1840, is nearing the end of it's useful life. This is the view put forward by our commercial colleagues Portishead Radio, the world-wide maritime radio station operated by British Telecom.

In the last eight years, CW traffic has decreased from 2,500 to 1,000 messages per day, and is presently tailing off at 10% each year. Tipped to "sink into oblivion" during the next decade, the hand-sent code is being replaced by modern automatic RadioTelex services.

When, in 1997, all ships will be required to be equipped with a Global Maritime Distress and Safety System the Morse distress watch will cease. Then perhaps the only code to be heard will be on the Amateur bands. Di-dah-dit Di-dit Di-dah-dah-dit.

GBIECN AND GBICBC - Dave G8UUO.

The callsign GB1ECN was licenced for 28 days, 504 contacts were made, mainly on 2m FM and SSB, with just a couple of contacts on 70cms. Best DX worked was John GW4FRX in Welshpool. Money is still being collected but it is hoped to raise accremisation. the Essex Children in Need Fund.

The callsign GB1CBC, (Chelmsford Borough Centenary) will be operating from 29th July -

25th August inclusive, as part of the Borough Celebrations.

DF NEWS - The Snowman - Dick, G3WHR.

No snow this year - so the event took place on schedule. Nine teams assembled on Fordham Heath for the start.

Both stations gave good signals with 60BTH/P being quite strong. Two competitors suffered from 180 degree sense errors - one was corrected at the start, but the other team

left heading in the wrong direction.

The A station GOBTH/P was hidden in some undeveloped ground near Parsons Heath, on the

outskirts of Colchester. One team took advantage of a remembered conversation with Paul while acting as his navigator, and successfully guessed the location. The rest of us investigated a small wood nearby before our bearings led us to the site. As usual there

were one or two earth stakes to find before the transmitter could be located.
