LAST MONTHS MEETING - ANNUAL FILM & VIDEO EVENING - Brian, GOBDS.

Last month saw 30 members gathered for this annual event, all looking forward to the planned programme:- "HF Field day 1989", "The Faraday lecture 1989", "DX HF Contest operating" and a video on loan from Waters & Stanton "GB5BN operating QRP from the top of Ben Nevis in 1989".

First of the bunch was an excellent 8mm super cine film shot at CARS Field day site, by Andrew, G4KQE. All the work needed to set up the station, like tents, mast and aerials, was evident on the film, along with commentary by Andrew. Also included was film of the local wildlife in the form of two blue-tits nesting quite unpeturbed in the old farm equipment near one of the mast guy stakes. As always this film brings back fond memories of the event where we all enjoyed ourselves so much.

Next came a superb video, one of the best we have ever shown entitled "Sight and Sound" which was given by the BBC as the Faraday Lecture 1989 by two professional TV production engineers. In it they gave an audio/visual demonstration of the reasoning behind and the way in which we use the old and new methods of AM, FM stereo and digital sound techniques with demonstrations of how the new TV picture improvements are being developed within the limited radio spectrum available. The involvement of computer technology in the production of these developments was clearly seen and one of the presenter's closing comments "with electronic technology advancing at such a pace, nobody will predict what will be available more than two years ahead", summed up the presentation.

The third and as it turned out final video, "N2AA preparing for and operating the 1981 DX HF contest" caused many a light-hearted comment to come from the audience. The QTH belonged to N2OJT, a multi-millionaire, who financed most of the multi-operator station and its aerial farm. They had such things as 195ft. towers with 4 element 80 metre beams and a 'SHACK' that looked like NASA control at Houston Space Centre. One mast and beam they had erected cost \$12,000 and lasted five weeks (after all they were 1000ft ASL and on a very exposed position). All the logging was done manually and at the final tally when they compared their claimed score with that of their known closest rival they had well over a million points, but were still less than the other station. Never mind, perhaps they had better luck the following year.

Well, that was the 1990 film and video evening, and although we didn't have time to show the Ben Nevis video, I am sure that all present thoroughly enjoyed the evening.
