<u>NEXT MEETING - Test Equipment</u>

With the advent of the "Black Box" transceiver, many Amateur Radio Shacks now enjoy state-of-art technology. It follows that the station owner/operator should feel that he/she must have elaborate test equipment to keep the station on the air.

During the May Meeting, Roy, G3PMX will attempt to explain why items of equipment such as Spectrum Analysers, Network Analysers, Frequency Counters and even Digital Voltmeters whilst being "nice to have" are not essential in managing a modern station and how basic items such as the Oscilloscope, the Analogue Multi-meter and home-brew networks that rely on first principals can satisfy the licence conditions.

NATIONAL FIELD DAY 1992

Although some doubts have been expressed regarding Radio Propagation from the Blackmore site, we will continue there until an alternative site (with trees) can be found.

Gwyn, G4FKH and Brian, GOBDS have braved the recent inclement weather to master-mind two Sunday afternoon expeditions to the Howletts Hall Farm for the purpose of measuring the strength of incoming signals on the 7MHz, 14MHz and 21MHz bands, as compared with the home based stations, G2HPF, G4INM, GOGJS, G5HF, GOLSH, GOLSY and G3PMX.

Results of this survey indicate that the received signals at the site that we have used over the past few years are well down compared with the listed locations, however, this does not mean that we will completely abandon the site but instead try our luck on a fresh plot on the same farmland also to pay more attention to the type of antennas we use!

LAST MONTHS MEETING RTTY & AMTOR - Harry, G2HPF

At last months meeting there was a good attendance to hear Geoff Mills, G3EDM talking on one of his favourite subjects AMTOR (Amateur Microprocessors Teleprinter over Radio).

First he gave a brief description of the normal RTTY system where each character is a string of 5 pulses which can be either a mark or space. There are only 32 different combinations of these pulses and this does not cover the minimum of 26 letters and 10 numbers required, let alone the need for punctuation and control codes.

So two codes Letters (LTRS) and figures (FIGS) are used to give two separate meanings to the 5 digit code sequence. LTRS covers the alphabetical characters and FIGS selects the numerical, punctuation and control codes. Of course some codes have to be the same in each case in order to keep control. Added to these is a start pulse at the beginning and a stop at the end.

The first use of this system keyed the transmitter on and off, but was subject to interference during the off period due to noise and QRM. So a system using two different frequencies for the mark and space was used. This can be done by frequency shift keying of the transmitter or more usually these days by AF modulation of a SSB transmitter, which both basically provide the same output signal when received at the far end. The AF modulation requires a modulator and demodulator (Modem) to produce two tones differing by 170Hz when fed with the digital pulses at the TX and produce DC pulses from the RX at the far end.

AMTOR is an advance on this system and uses a 7 bit code instead of a 5 bit code. This gives a larger selection of combinations, and if only the codes containing 4 marks and 3 spaces are used, the receive end will reject any other combination and can request a repeat of the faulty one. This is not completely foolproof as here two blacks can make a white!

During the "handshake" mode the TX will send 3 letters and wait for an, acknowledgement from the far end before continuing with the message. A failure of the return path is considered as a request for a repeat. So both stations are constantly changing from TX to RX and the switching has to be fast. But more important is the time for the radio signal itself, which in the case of a circuit from the UK to Australia and back again puts a limit to the speed at which the system can operate and is about 100 baud.

Geoff produced printouts of traffic from VK3WR which were impressive. If a two minute message is sent and during half the time there is QRM, the requests for repeats will put the total time required

for the message up to 4 minutes, but the final copy at the far end can still be nearly 100% error free.

A show of hands at the end of the meeting indicated that quite a few members were interested in AMTOR, I am, provided I can find someone willing to swap a PK232 for a PK88, plus adjustment.

Thank you Geoff for another very interesting talk, I know the system works because you got V85GA for me via the mailbox.

VHF ROUND TABLE - Ela, G6HKM

Roy and I attended this event at Martlesham on the 12th of April, and we had a most enjoyable day.

The venue was the luxurious Restaurant and Coffee Lounge at the BT Research Centre, *which* provided acres of room for all of us, about 50 in total, all very keen VHF operators including a contingent from Wales, 2 from the Netherlands and a yl from Germany.

A good range of test equipment was available by courtesy of BT and extensive tests were carried out on a wide range of VHF equipment, pre-amps were being tuned up etc, the equipment available was an amateurs dream come true.
