
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# **NEXT MEETING**

#### ALMOST OURS - Andrew, G4KQE

Since my report in August, Phil and I have taken part in the rest of the National Qualifying D.F. events. Late July took us to Manchester. No, it doesn't always rain in Manchester, it positively pours, we got soaked, but we came third, so I suppose it was worth it. In August we were off to Banbury, we made very good time on the first transmitter, but unfortunately lost time on the second and came 9th out of 15.

Each year, points are awarded on a Grand Prix basis for each event. The winner gets 9 points, second gets 6, third gets 4, and so on. These points accumulate and at the National Final a Silver Rosebowl is awarded to the competitor with the highest number of points.

After Banbury, the points accumulated were such that only two people could win the Rosebowl, Alan Simmonds of Mid-Thames club, and Phil. To achieve the Rosebowl, we had to win the last event in Torbay, Devon, and Alan had to come 7th or worse, but at least it was statistically possible so we decided to give of our best.

Once we had plotted the start bearings, the map indicated that the first transmitter could be in one of three places, so we positioned ourselves strategically for the next transmission. Our two bearings crossed on the edge of Kennick Reservoir on Dartmoor, and a third bearing en route confirmed this. We pulled into the car park by the reservoir and saw the operator's car, but no-one else's!, so we knew we were first on site. The transmitter came up and the D.F. set pointed to the top end of a nearby wood. We ran into the wood and after only a minute or so of hunting I spotted the operator, and we signed-in. It was only 2.36 p.m. and although we didn't know it then, we were half an hour ahead of the rest of the competitors.

Fired with this early success, we set off again. A couple of bearings later we had identified the next transmitter as being in Fernworthy Forest (part of Dartmoor), on arriving we parked up alongside two other competitor's cars. The forest was a good mile from the road, so we had to hike it across the moor, which essentially is thick heather interspersed with wet bog, not at all easy going when you are in a hurry.

As we ran towards the forest, we saw the other teams running back to their cars; this would be their first transmitter, and we were on the way to our second, so we realised that we were in with a chance!

We ran into the forest, down a track, and at half past three, an hour before the contest ends, we found some aerial wire strung up across some pine trees. THE ROSEBOWL WAS OURS!!!

Unfortunately, that Master of cunning, Paul Clark, had designed the aerial system and erected it the day before - there was wire everywhere! There were tee-ins, earth stakes, the lot. The D.F. set was confused by all the wire and earth stakes and took us all over the place, but not to the transmitter. The forest where we were was a Christmas Tree plantation and they were so thick that you couldn't walk through them, only crawl underneath. We searched high and low, ran up and down the track, followed wires as far as we could see them, but to no avail. We had earlier seen other life forms in the wood also searching and at the 4.30 deadline we realised that our initial good lead had been lost; the teams we saw running out of the forest must have been able to get to the first transmitter before the end. Dejectedly we made our way back to the car tea site.

Everybody had expected us to win, as we were known to have made such good time initially, and that we were seen running to our second station at  $3.15 \, p.m$ . The results confirmed our worst fears, we had come  $7^{th}$  out of 9, and Alan Simmonds had come  $6^{th}$ . If only we had been able to locate the second transmitter within  $35 \, \text{minutes}$  of finding the aerial we would have won the Silver Rosebowl.

We were obviously very disappointed, having been to all of the qualifying events and set our hearts on the Rosebowl. Perhaps next year we will clinch the trophy, which at 3.30 p.m. on the last qualifying event was almost ours!
