Last Month's Meeting - Geoff, G7KLV

Life seems to follow a regular pattern. Just before Christmas we had the Ken and Eddie Show (Clarke and George that is). A quarter of one percent up. No, sorry, it was down, wasn't it. The savers lose and the borrowers gain! We had our excellent Christmas Dinner. And then after Christmas at our last meeting we had our traditional film evening. Our Tom and Jerry Show,but more on that anon.

Geoff Hardcastle of the College had been working hard setting up the Video Projection Unit they had recently acquired. We were to be the guinea pigs. We immediately found viewing much easier for those of us at the back. It also seemed to give the films extra presence! Assisted by our own Eric G8ADX, Geoff kept a watchful eye on the equipment all evening in case of problems which might arise due to overheating since it is now mounted differently from it's original position.

To start the evening we had part of a BBC2 film about amateur radio, suitably edited to avoid the reference to the non-licensed nosey parker listening to Princess Di's mobile 'phone on a scanner.

To remind us that there are other uses for electricity than Morse, SSB and JVFAX, the second film of the evening was a reminder of times past in our own industrial heartland, in those far off days of full employment when we actually made things. Those of us with Marconi backgrounds tend to forget or remain unaware that there was another equally innovative electrical company in town. John Jay, the Stanley Wood of Crompton-Parkinson, loaned us one of their publicity films made in 1947. We saw scenes in the machine shops manufacturing motors and switchgear together with a row of attractive young ladies making moving coil meters. Other C-P factories were shown. Cable making at Derby, lamps at Guiseley, batteries at New Malden, electric vehicles at Leicester and Brum and transformers at Hayes. We saw sparks flying at the ASTA testing plant at Chelmsford where a piece of switchgear was tested to destruction with spectacular results.

Harry G5HF recalled the trouble caused when the skilled Crompton workers discovered that the film hands (the clapper loaders, best boys and all those other hangers on that seem to be inevitable necessities of the film and TV production industries) earned much more than they did!

Incidentally, John Jay has promised to talk to us about Colonel Crompton at our December meeting.

Getting back to our main interest, we had a very well produced video of the setting up of the Radioteam Finland station on the island of Curaco for the CQ SSB contest in 1990. Due to it's position on latitude 12 degrees north it has been a favourite site for contests in the past. The equipment used would justify an entry in the Guiness Book of Records and I quote - 10,300ft of coax, 4,500ft of rotor cable, 2,800ft of electric cable, 508 metres of towers and 25 custom built antennas ranging from 10 to 160 metres. The antennas and the towers were built by their "Mr. Aluminium" OH6RM.

There were about 30 operators manning 15 brand new Yaesu FT-1000's. Logging was hand written and then transferred to 15 Compaq portables equipped with MUF maps and Miniprop using their own program.

Two sites were set up. A bulldozer and an 18 ton crane were in constant use. (conitnued on page 2)

One operating site was in an existing building and the other some distance away had two purpose built Portakabins. Power was provided by a 300KVA generator with two 6KVA sets as standby. After various set-backs due to unforeseen weather conditions the station was ready on time.

Surprise, surprise! Radioteam Finland won the contest by notching up 52,300,000 points! Later they won the CQ CW contest with 39,300,000 points. The film ended with the team signing off individually and Ela was delighted to see some of her fellow 6 metre enthusiasts.

We stopped for tea halfway through the last film and Geoff noticed that the convergence was drifting off so the opportunity was taken to have a little tweak. After the break we resumed but the picture was a bit washed out. However, this did not spoil our enjoyment of the film. Towards the end it appeared as if the recorder was struggling as well. It was getting late so it was decided to forego the highlight of the evening-Chris's two Tom and Jerry's!

As soon as the film ended Eric delved into the equipment and found that the red gun had not been switched on again after the tea break tweak! I also discovered that the recorder was OK and that the original film had a fault.

So, it can safely be said that Video Projection is an unqualified success and our thanks must go to Geoff Hardcastle for his sterling efforts.

Our thanks also to Ela and Roy. Their final Pick-n-Mix sale raised £12.50 for club funds.

SLOW SCAN TV NET

Progress Report by Roy, G3PMX


The Thursday evening net on 28.680MHz initiated by Chris, G0IPU is gaining in popularity and is providing an excellent foundation for members to fine-tune their JVFAX systems through transmitting and receiving pictures.

As with the CARS phone net on Tuesday evenings, there have been a few cross polarisation problems with aerials but most stations are now using verticals and the resulting increase in signal strength is producing noise free pictures. One of the problems with cross polarisation, when the signal is marginal, is phase distortion caused by passing aircraft; on phone this effect does not impair the readability too much but with pictures the definition and colours are spoiled by the multipath propagation.

Stations transmitting pictures are G0IPU, G3CVI, G0GJS and G4EZK with receive only stations G5HF and G3PMX who are able to report results on phone on the same frequency in between pictures, however, the net does not exclude stations who cannot transmit on 10 metres because Chris monitors 144.525MHz for any VHF stations wishing to give reports.

One of the difficulties in running the net is finding sufficient new royalty free pictures to transmit. Pictures available on CD-ROMS are rather expensive and somewhat restricted in their subject matter. Chris is able to "grab" single frames from his video camera to make original pictures and Roy is putting his flatbed scanner to good use by converting photographs to the digital mode, achieving at least 5 picture files on a HD floppy disk.

Setting up JVFAX is now easier by the experiences and advice from the stations participating on the net and we expect more members to join in the pleasure. When the receiver and computer are working well together, further interest can be found by tuning round the amateur bands to see picture exchanges between other countries.
